About the NHS

- The National Health Service (NHS) was launched in 1948 it is the world's largest publicly funded health service. It currently supports 66.4 million people
- There are around 112,000 doctors and 311,000 nurses working in the NHS
- Around 1 in 8 staff working in the NHS are from abroad

There are a number of organisations that exist to support the NHS' structure, patients and staff. Many of these organisations have information, services and support for internal medical graduates (IMGs). These are listed below:

British Medical Association and Trade Unions

The British Medical Association (BMA) is the trade union and professional body for doctors in the UK. The BMA represents doctors both individually and collectively, negotiating your pay and rights and supporting you at work.

There are other trade unions for doctors you can join, one alternative trade union for doctors to the BMA is <u>HCAS</u> (the <u>Hospital Doctor's Union</u>).

You do not need to be a member to access the following support for new doctors to the UK

NHS Employers

NHS England, Workforce, Training and Education (formerly Health Education England)

NHS England, Workforce, Training and Education (NHS WTE) formerly called Health Education England (HEE) exists to support the delivery of excellent healthcare and health improvement by recruiting, training and educating doctors in England. HEE has recently merged with NHS England (NHSE WTE) and you may currently see both terms and the old term still in use, however, please note, this is the same organisation.

Their national induction programme has been designed to ensure that all international medical graduates recruited to the NHS are welcomed, valued and supported as they transition to UK clinical practice.

General Medical Council

The General Medical Council (GMC) works to protect patient safety and improve medical education and practice across the UK. They have put on a free workshop aimed at new doctors to the UK. This workshop offers practical guidance about ethical scenarios you may encounter and gives you the change to connect with other doctors coming from abroad.

In order to access this you will need a GMC online account.

If you have a GMC reference number you can sign in using this.

If you do not have a GMC reference number you first need to go to the <u>application route finder</u>. This will tell you which application to apply for. More information and support is on their website here.

Revalidation and Appraisal

Every licensed doctor who practises medicine must revalidate. Revalidation supports you to develop your practice, drives improvements in clinical governance.

At the Trust, the Medical Director, Dr Julian Redhead, is the responsible officer.

Revalidation is undertaken as part of a five yearly cycle.

The General Medical Council has information on how this can be done: Revalidation - GMC (gmc-uk.org)

Appraisal is the formal annual process that can be referred as a time of facilitated self-review supported by information gathered from the doctor's full scope of work. Annual appraisals is required in order for doctors to receive a positive revalidation recommendation and, consequently, retain their licence to practise. More information about appraisal will be given as part of the Trust Corporate Induction.

GMC Guidance on Good Medical Practice and Ethics

The GMC have a range of online resources covering good medical practice; topics covered include consent, end of life, leadership and management, raising concerns, child protection and confidentiality. The Trust, like other NHS Trusts in the UK provides indemnity protection for cases of clinical negligence.

It is advisable to consider membership of a Medical Defence (MDO) organisation, such as The Medical Defence Union or Medical Protection Society, who provide medico-legal advice and assistance 24 hours a day 7 days a week alongside the right for their members to request legal advice and representation for to corner's inquests, "good Samaritan" acts, disciplinary procedures, complaints, GMC referrals and similar, for a membership fee (this is not the same as medical insurance). The vast majority of doctors in the UK belong to such an organisation.

You may need to consider taking out your own medical insurance if you undertake work outside of the NHS.

Royal Colleges

Medical Royal Colleges are overarching bodies who are responsible for training in one or more specialty. They set standards for their specialty such as the specialty curriculum. The majority of these are members of the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges, who provide a list of their members here





Population Health in North West London

Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust provides acute and specialist healthcare for over one million people every year.

- North West London is a diverse area with 2.4 million people from more than 200 ethnicities
- 12.3% of the population are over the age of 65 (national average is 19%)

Imperial NHS Trust is part of NHS North West London. They are responsible for contracting healthcare services locally and the oversight of the local budget.

It looks after primary, secondary and community care.

NHS North West London looks after the following boroughs (areas within London):



North West London Integrated Care System (ICS)

An NHS commissioner is responsible for planning and purchasing healthcare for the local population.

Commissioning is the process of assessing needs, planning and prioritising, purchasing and monitoring health services to get the best health outcomes.

Integrated care systems are partnerships that bring together providers (an organisation that directly gives healthcare services) and commissioners (a public authority which pays for healthcare services) of NHS services across a geographical area with local authorities and other local partners to collectively plan health and care services to meet the needs of the population.





The North West London Integrated Care System (ICS) brings together a range of organisations including local authorities and partners responsible for delivery and planning of health and care service within the 8 boroughs.

Across England, there are 42 integrated care systems and integrated care boards. You can read more from NHS England about integrated care here.

Health challenges in North West London

- Life expectancy is 7.2 years lower for men and 5.5 years lower for women (than average)
- 1 in 10 people have diabetes or non-diabetic hyperglycaemia
- Alcohol admissions in Ealing are above the average in England with 2200 admissions a year per 100,000 people (England 1815)
- Rates of emergency hospital admissions for self-harm as twice as high Hounslow as they are in Harrow
- 50% of all adults over 18 are overweight

Setting up a UK Bank Account

Getting a bank account | Citizens Advice

Collecting your BRP should be a priority when you first arrive in the UK. You should have received instructions from the Home Office about this as part of your visa application.

You should apply for a bank account as soon as you're able to as it can sometimes take a few days.

Here are a few popular high-street banks that international medical graduates often open their first account with. You can find out more information on their websites:

You will need the following documents to open a bank account:

- Employment contract
- Original passport
- Evidence of address
- Photographic identification
- Biometric residence permit (BCP) with National Insurance (NI) number

Utilities (Water, Electricity, Gas, Telecoms)Water

In the UK water is supplied by a standard provider in each region. For the London area this is Thames Water





If you aren't sure who your water supplier is or you have moved to one of the surrounding counties to London and want to confirm you can <u>check here</u>

Home Energy (Electricity and Gas)

Electricity and Gas supply in the UK is privatised, this means you can usually choose your supplier (check your tenancy agreement as some state which supplier you should use).

Please be aware that some homes may have only electricity or gas, so do check with your landlord/estate agent if you are unsure.

OfGem is the regulator for these services – their website provides information about how to find an energy supplier, how to check who is currently supplying energy to your home and what to do in an emergency e.g. smelling gas or during a power cut

Home Telephone and Internet

You may not need a home telephone but, like electricity and gas supply, providers of the service are privatised in the UK, this means that you can choose your supplier should you wish to have one.

Council Tax

Council Tax is a form of taxation in the UK which is payable to the local authority (Council) in the area in which you live and is based on the valuation of the property in which you live (known as Council Tax Band).

TV License

In the UK it is necessary to have a TV License which is a legal permission to install or use television receiving equipment to watch live on any channel, TV service or streaming service, and to use BBC iPlayer on any device. This applies regardless of which television channels a person receives or how those channels are received (in other words it doesn't matter if you only watch non BBC Channels you still need a TV license).

Core Skills training

All new starters to the Trust need to complete 10 core skills e-learning modules in the first 2 weeks of starting at the Trust. These are determined by the national NHS core skills training framework. The level of training will depend on your staff group and department.

- 1. Equality, diversity and human rights
- 2. Health, safety and welfare
- 3. NHS conflict resolution
- 4. Fire safety
- 5. Infection prevention and control
- 6. Moving and handling
- 7. Safeguarding (adults and children)
- 8. Preventing radicalisation
- 9. Resuscitation
- 10. Information governance

There are also a further set of clinical modules that junior doctors need to undertake.

Core Skills training is completed using an integrated learning management system, <u>LEARN</u>. You will be sent your login details to this system within your first week.

Once you login you will see the courses you need to complete. Please note it may be a few weeks from your start date before you can access LEARN.

You will also have a local induction, which should be with a Consultant or SAS doctor in the first few days in the department.


