

Hearing aid batteries Information for patients, relatives and carers

All hearing aids are powered by small batteries, the size of which is determined by the hearing aid you have. Batteries are provided free of charge if you have been issued with NHS hearing aids and, if you request supplies by telephone or email, we can post them to you (see contact information on page 2). Please see below to identify the battery for your hearing aid.



Hearing aid batteries should last between 5 and 14 days, but may last longer. The life expectancy of the battery depends on a number of factors such as how often you wear your hearing aid, the battery size and the level of your hearing loss.

Your hearing aid will warn you when your battery power is low by playing some beeps into your ear. This pre-warning starts when the battery has only a few hours left and may be repeated at regular intervals. If the battery runs out the instrument will turn off. This does not mean there is a fault.

To replace the battery, follow these instructions:

- 1. Open the battery door completely
- 2. Remove the old battery from the battery compartment.
- 3. Remove the sticky label from the positive (+) side of the new battery and let the battery sit for at least one minute.
- 4. Any moisture on the battery surface should be wiped off before insertion.
- 5. Make sure that the flat side of the battery (marked positive +) faces upwards when placed in the battery drawer. If the battery does not fit in the drawer or the door is difficult to close the battery may be the wrong way up. Do not force the battery door to close, as this can damage the hearing aid.
- 6. Close the battery door.

Used batteries can be returned to the department for recycling. Please note that used batteries are a Royal Mail restricted item and should not be sent through the post.

Battery risks

Swallowing batteries or inserting them in the nose or ears can cause serious injury or death.

Please let your audiologist know if you are living with young children or an adult who may be at increased risk of swallowing a battery. This includes people with a learning disability, dementia or other sensory or cognitive impairment. We are able to attach a secure battery compartment to your hearing aids – please let us know if this is needed.

Storage

It is important to store batteries out of reach and in a safe place, where anyone who is at risk is not able to access them. Avoid storing batteries in excessively hot or cold temperatures.

What to do in an emergency

If you think someone has swallowed a battery or inserted it into their ear or nose, you must take them to the nearest A&E as soon as possible.
